

a. Monthly Reports

Board members reviewed the monthly library reports provided by Robbee Tonubbee.

Gloria Hodge asked about how the Dolly Parton Imagination Library program is faring with the recent DOGE cuts to the Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS), which affects grants and state aid for libraries, among other things. The Imagination Library is funded by previously committed money for now, and by donations from the community, including an angel donor. However, prices have been rising each year due to rising postage costs. The monthly cost for shipping books for all the children enrolled in the program is now up to about \$1500 per month.

Board members also discussed the abundance of blood drives being hosted at the library in recent months.

4. Administration

Robbee Tonubbee presented a library report:

- I. Hannah Barnett left the library in mid-February. Robbee has taken over her tax season duties, which include checking people in and answering some questions.
- II. Spring Break activities are happening this week. Robbee has been popping lots of popcorn and selling cafe items.
- III. Bailey Woods will be filling the community center manager position. She previously worked at the Antlers library before accepting this position. She will start work next week and will work a Tuesday through Saturday schedule.
- IV. The Makerspace is up and running in the former quiet reading room. It is divided into two sections, The Forge and Sew You Think You Can Craft. The Forge incorporates 3D and resin printers and gaming sessions for kids and teens. Sew You Think You Can Craft will have different sewing and crafting machines available where people can book sessions to use the machines on their own or with a knowledgeable volunteer to assist.
- V. Lulu and Hazel Quilt Shop will have a craft day for kids on Saturday, March 22, for Spring Break.
- VI. Phyllis Rustin asked about VA assistance. There is an Oklahoma Department of Veterans Affairs representative who meets with people by appointment at the Choctaw Nation Headquarters.
- VII. Kaylee Curry asked about the Summer Reading Program. The program will start on the first Tuesday in June.
- VIII. April is Financial Literacy Month. The library has literacy-themed board games that Jami Ellis will be playing with the kids in the after-school program and in homeschool groups.
- IX. Jami has changed the after-school program to a board game club. Attendance

has increased as a result.

Grants/Projects

The Oklahoma Department of Libraries awarded the library a Technology grant that will purchase a scanning wand & tablet for inventory. This grant for \$4044 will allow staff to cut the time needed to do inventory down to a matter of hours vs. weeks. The wand can scan at a rate of 18,000 items per hour negating the need to pull individual books, type in the bar code, and return to the shelf. This scanning wand is synced to a tablet and then waved along shelves for a real-time inventory of items in circulation. Areas like non-fiction will continue to be hand-scanned. The wand will be deployed in September.

Gale Online High School graduates receive a high school diploma. The original grant provided for 5 scholarships (\$1100 ea.) for this program. Community Engagement
